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Vespers to mark Archbishop Dermot Farrell's appointment

"When I entered Maynooth in 1972, I never dreamt that one day I would be standing here as the Archbishop of Dublin ... I did not seek out this new pastoral assignment, but allowed myself to be called, and accompanied."

hese were the opening words of Archbishop Dermot Farrell in his address to the College community and guests at a Solemn Vespers in the College Chapel on 12 May, deferred due to the public health restrictions, to mark the occasion of his appointment as Archbishop of Dublin.

After the Vespers, College President, Rev Prof Michael Mullaney, presented Archbishop Farrell on behalf of the College community with a specially commissioned pectoral cross, a silver replica of a penal cross in the College Museum, dating from 1738. The cross was cast by local artist Jarlath Daly.

Archbishop Farrell's association with the College spans twenty-seven years as student, lecturer, President, now Trustee and Ordinary of the diocese in which the College is located. He is the third president of the College to become the Archbishop of Dublin, following Archbishops Daniel Murray and William Walsh.

Archbishop Farrell shared three "cardinal points, landmarks or touchstones", which after forty-two years of priesthood were helpful in sustaining him; "things that endure rather pass away."

The first is that Jesus must become the centre of our vocations and our lives. We must come to know him, not just his words, but his

life, his priorities and values, his suffering, death and resurrection. Each one of us must develop and own our own image of Christ, who "matures as we mature."

The second is that we must have a care for people. Our lives are lives of service for the other; the social call of the gospel must never be beyond our horizon. There is a danger that after almost two centuries of a very socially engaged Catholicism in this country, that we might retreat from that, but that would not just be a loss, it would be a deep misreading of our call.

Thirdly, we must discover the wisdom to know how to be respectful for the person who is from me. It is essential today to be able to connect with people and acknowledge them even if they hold views that are different from the Church in whose name I speak and act. There is a need "to lower the emotion so that reason can be heard; nobody is defined by an adjective."





Undergraduate Open Day

Future of Christian Thinking conference

he Faculty of Philosophy at St Patrick's hosted an international conference on the Future of Christian Thinking from April 27th to 30th. Twenty keynote speakers along with over 100 participants attended over the course of the conference with the Aula Maxima filled at each session. Topics ranged from the practice of philosophy within a Christian context, engagement with historical figures, the future shape of philosophy and indeed Christian thinking, and the spectre of the end of Christian thinking.

The atmosphere at the conference, on campus, and indeed in the bars and restaurants in Maynooth was buzzing. A spotlight was shone on philosophy at St Patrick's Maynooth establishing the faculty as one of high international repute.

The Faculty of Philosophy is very proud to have hosted this conference, and we are grateful to the President and all of those who worked in the background for their support, in particular a word of thanks is due to our indefatigable doctoral students for their daily support. Philosophy at St Patrick's continues to go from strength to strength since the Faculty was re-established in 2019, and this conference is testimony to its place not only in St Patrick's but also on the international stage.

Panellists included former minister for Education Mary Hanafin, Dr Fáinche Ryan, Dr Eugene Duffy, Dr David Chiddick, David Kennedy, and College alumni. There was very positive feedback from all the participants and a number of other supporters who were unable to attend on the day. The summit is the beginning of a process of engagement, and this will continue with follow-up discussions with the participants during the coming months.

guests to join in the celebration of the Easter Triduum in the College Chapel from Holy Thursday to the Easter Vigil 14-16 April.





New Professor of **Moral Theology**

Tobias Winright has been appointed Prof of Moral Theology at St Patrick's Pontifical University. Tobias brings nearly 25 years of experience as a Catholic moral theologian to his new role at SPPU. His most recent academic appointment was at Saint Louis University in St. Louis, Missouri from 2005 to 2022.

He has authored, co-authored, edited, and co-edited seven books, most recently the T&T Clark Handbook of Christian Ethics (T&T Clark 2021) and Serve and Protect: Selected Essays on Just Policing (Cascade Books 2020), as well as numerous articles in peer-reviewed journals and popular opinion pieces in periodicals, including

> 2022 Irish Theological Quarterly (ITQ) lecture online entitled: Theological Foundations of Pope Francis' Integral Ecology.

In her lecture Dr Drummond explored the concept of 'integral ecology' particularly in relation to Pope Francis' recent writings including Laudato Si'. She spoke of the need for a new ecological culture, one that is in tune with the natural world. This is, moreover, an

invitation to a different way of approaching economics and offers an alternate vision of human progress. In the lecture and subsequent discussions, Dr Drummond teased out these ideas. Her full lecture will appear later in the year in the theological journal of St Patrick's College, the Irish Theological Quarterly.
